FROM THCA PRESIDENT MARTY KUSHNER



The summer is coming to a close, and it has been a hot one. It seems to me that the only thing hotter than the weather is our **Tobin Hill Neighborhood and the Tobin Hill Community Association!** Its true.... all you have to do is look around you for proof. One of the honors of being President of THCA is representing our neighborhood at various community meetings. Often attending these meetings are the Presidents of other Neighborhood Associations. I can not tell you how many times they mention our growth, progress, and just plain good organization. They seem to have positive thoughts and comments about THCA's projects, our visibility, our Newsletter, and our openness at Public Meetings. It is easy to smile and listen to the positive feedback (dare I say their envy), but the fact is that none of this could be possible without the dedication of our hard working board, committee members, volunteers, and our Tobin Hill neighbors.

Tobin Hill is also being noticed in local publications as well. Within the past few weeks the front page of the *San Antonio Express News* Business Section (September 6th edition) featured an extensive article about the new East Quincy Townhomes that will be built on the south-eastern most section of Tobin Hill. Currently the site of an automotive paint and body shop), the project will be located at the corner of East Quincy and Newell and will include one, two, and three bedroom units that will be sold for \$220,000 to \$375,000. The September edition of a new publication called *Local Community News* (distributed monthly via the mail) included a two page feature about the Second Friday Tobin Hill Art Walk. ("Second Friday Art Walk offers something for nearly every fancy... from fastidious to funky, from elegant to eye-popping.") Even *the Trinitonian*, Trinity University's weekly student newspaper, takes note of Tobin Hill. The September 7th issue had an article called *Culture map: SA Neighborhood profile*. Tobin Hill was featured, saying "Like Monte Vista, the neighborhood has beautiful old homes, but its population is much more diverse..., the Pearl Brewery has boosted the neighborhood's economy and made it a haven for hip young people."

But there is so much more. The Terramark Corporation has recently announced a new development called *Ogden Modern*, located on the corner of Ogden and Myrtle that will include 11 townhomes selling for between \$164,900 and \$179,900. This project is the first of at least three Tobin Hill projects the company has planned for the area between McCullough and Main. Also, have you noticed the changes going on at the old "Atomex" nightclub locate on McCullough and Dewey? In the next few months it will become the the new home of Taqueria Chapala Jalisco (currently located across the street from the new location). Add to all this the new Tobin Lofts (On Main)... Well, you get the idea!

On a personal note, I am proud to say that within the last month three homes located within a block of my home have been sold and are currently occupied by young resident owners. Once again, a very positive thing for our neighborhood.

It is really is all quite exciting to be in Tobin Hill!

Reporting Potential Violations to the Historic Building Enforcement Officer

To help protect the City's historic resources, residents are encouraged to notify the Office of Historic Preservation of potential violations. To report a concern:


1. Gather information. Be prepared to provide the address of the property in question and a brief description of the potential violation or concern. Photographs are helpful but not necessary.
2. Call 210.219.2093 or email Ron Meyers, Historic Building Enforcement Officer, at ron.meyers@sanantonio.gov or OHP@sanantonio.gov during regular business hours (7:45am - 4:30pm) to report your concerns. After-hours complaints should be registered by phone through 311 or by email at OHP@sanantonio.gov.
3. You can report potential problems anonymously or provide contact information for follow-up.

A MESSAGE FROM POLICE CHIEF MCMANUS

I am pleased to report that, due in large part to our neighborhood policing units like SAFFE and POP, in fiscal year 2012, we have seen a 16% increase in arrests, a 23% increase in Narcotics Charges, and a 160% increase in gang arrests. Because of residents like you, partnering with the SAPD, San Antonio has one of the lowest rates of violent crime among major cities.



Additionally, due to a variety of reasons, we have reduced the average police response time to emergency calls by almost 15% (about 45 seconds). These achievements and partnerships, in addition to other initiatives to combat aggressive drivers, DWIs, and wrong-way driving are paying off to make San Antonio a better place to live.

But, we're not resting on our laurels. Some of our fiscal year 2013 proposals include:

- Enhancing our Gang and Narcotics units,
- Replacing aging helicopter equipment to increase the readiness and availability, and
- Civilianizing some support positions so officers currently filling those roles can return to street duty.

With strong support from the community, the Mayor, and City Council, the SAPD can continue to build on the progress we've made together.

CRIME PREVENTION

One of the most significant challenges we face in San Antonio is Property Crime, specifically thefts, which account for more than 70% of all property crimes. Some things you and your neighbors can do to prevent theft include:

- Park in well lit areas whenever possible
- Lock your car doors and keep your windows rolled up (even when parked at home)
- Put valuables (including chargers and window mounts) in the trunk or take them with you
- Keep a list of serial numbers for valuable items
- Report thefts to the police immediately

A LITTLE BIT OF TOBIN HILL HISTORY VOL. 13

King's Court

In Tobin Hill there's a street named King's Court, but King's Court is also an idea, and an example of what determined neighborhood residents can do. Read on.

In 1984, a proposal was made to demolish 48 homes, many occupied by long-term elderly residents, as part of a large commercial project. In response, Tobin Hill Neighborhood, River Road Neighborhood, Monte Vista Neighborhood, and the parish of Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic Church all joined together in an attempt to maintain the residential character of the area. In February 1985, a local newspaper reported:

The proposed residential/commercial project of Embrey Investment Inc. has drawn fire from a newly formed coalition of neighborhood groups....because it will replace existing housing with condominiums. --- Embrey...is working on the problem of providing housing for some of the people who would be displaced by the project. "There's a possibility that a coalition could be formed...to provide some kind of housing for the elderly"....

This is what the **North San Antonio Times** reported in May 1985 about the reaction to the proposed Embrey Investments Inc. project:

The proposed 10-acre residential/commercial development would be bordered by Kings Court, East Huisache Avenue, Stadium Drive, North St. Mary's Street, and East Mistletoe Avenue. --- Forty-seven houses would be demolished to build the project.... --- A coalition of representatives from neighborhood associations ... has gone on record as opposed to Embrey's original plan.

In May 1987 a local newspaper reported:

An agreement has been reached to build a massive business-retail complex on the near North Side. --- The Trinity Plaza development will be done in two phases: Phase 1 is a three-building ... office complex on the east side of U.S. 281 at Mulberry Avenue. --- Phase 2...is on the west side of U.S. 281 at North St. Mary's Street.... --- In reaching the agreement, Embrey Investments agreed to deed 1.6 acres of the property along Kings Court Street to the Kings Court Housing Foundation.

The King's Court Housing Foundation's Mission statement: The King's Court Housing Foundation's mission is to encourage neighborhood stability by promoting affordable housing for those with low to moderate income through new construction of replacement housing as well as repair and rehabilitation of existing housing, including ownership and operation of properties.

The Foundation is now a 501 (c)(3) nonprofit, the primary focus of which is new construction of multifamily senior rental homes. It presently owns and operates 32 units of low density senior rental housing located at 220 King's Court.

THE GARDEN VIEW

Now this bugs me

Oh, dear, insects are eating in my garden. I have a bunch of bumps on the leaves of my Texas persimmon. They gall me. They are galls; and they are all over the tree. Maybe I should cut the tree down. Oh wait, I could spray the tree. Too late, I should have thought about that in the spring when the gall wasps were laying their eggs. That's when the tree strikes back and forms a wall around the larva to protect itself. Except it doesn't work, it just protects the little darlings and lets them eat away to maturity. But in spring there weren't any galls, so I wouldn't have thought about it. Catch 22. So maybe I'd better cut it down.

OK, so you are probably on to me by now and know I am leading you down the garden path, so to speak. Cutting down a tree for such a frivolous reason isn't my style. Galls really don't hurt the tree and are kind of interesting. Plus, what you need in your garden are more insects.

Well, didn't you tell yourself you wanted to see birds from your window or patio? What do you think they are going to come to your garden for if it isn't to eat? They certainly aren't going to nest if they can't find food for their young. And insects are what many of them eat. Even those that prefer seeds much of the year need meat to raise their young. I used to think of cardinals as seeds eaters; just look at their beaks, and they love sunflower seeds. Then one spring I saw a pair frequenting my passionflower vine, only to see them carrying off gulf fritillary caterpillars several times a day.

I have an imaginary reader who is grumpy and contrarian. To you I say if you don't want insects, plant exotics. I have a landscaping book published in 1985 that asserts it is unwise to use native plants in the landscape because they have problems with insects. Isn't that wild? In fact, the nursery trade has been importing plants that don't have insect problems for many decades. Some have become invasive, displacing natives. So plant the exotic red-tipped photinia or pittosporum and you won't have any insect problems. You will also have a limited number of bird species, mostly exotic grackles, pigeons, starlings, and English sparrows.

The richer the number of plant species, the more insect species and the more variety of butterflies and birds. Oh and did you know that migrating birds don't make the trip in one fell swoop? They make stopovers during which they stock up on food to get them through the trip. The more food there is, the more will make it to their destinations and the more chicks will survive to adulthood. Populations of many migratory birds have dropped 50% in the last 50 years. Wouldn't you like to help?

If you don't want to take my word for it or just want to feel more miserable, read this article by one of our more eloquent proponents of backyard habitats: <http://www.americanforests.org/magazine/article/backyard-biodiversity>. Really, he'll buck you up and show how you can make a difference. OK, so I'm putting down that gun, uh, spray bottle and pouring myself a beer. Anyone?
